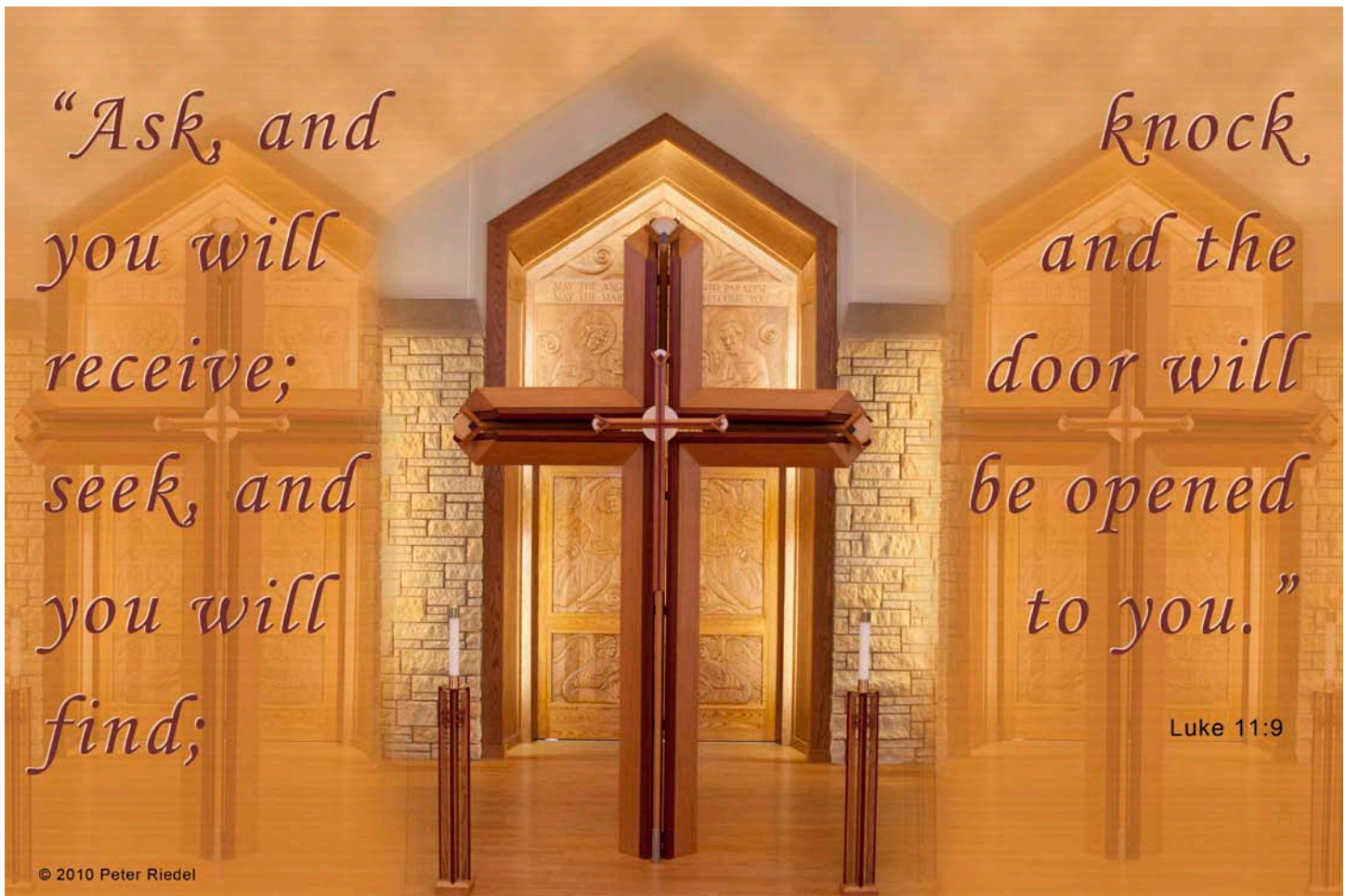

### God Spared All

Most of us know how to strike a good bargain in the marketplace. But is it possible to use such tactics with God? Can God's mind be changed like ours? Abraham was a man of faith, but he was also a realist. He was not blind to sinful humankind. Though Abraham prayed for justice, he also prayed for compassion. Would the innocent be swept away with the guilty? Abraham struck a bargain with God. If there were 50 righteous people in the city, would God spare it for their sake? How about 45? 30? 20? Would God spare the city for just 10? God was a willing negotiator. For the sake of some, God spared all.

Because Jesus knew God intimately, he taught us to pray with confidence to God as our "Father." God is merciful and just, and God pardons our sins. The debt we owe is a null and void contract, nailed to the cross and canceled in the waters of salvation. Though we were dead in sin, we are raised to new life. Jesus offers the bread of life to nourish us each day. The door of God's heart is opened wide to those who share God's loving-kindness with others.

**For Reflection:** Pray the Lord's Prayer for someone who does not know God's mercy. **Pray the Lord's Prayer for your own needs.** "Where did I experience God's presence and accept His invitation today? **Where did I turn away from Him?"**

### The Role of the Permanent Deacon at the Liturgy (#5)

The revised *General Instruction on the Roman Missal* from 2003 stipulates the actions for which the deacon is responsible during the Mass. The strong presumption is that his discharge of liturgical actions is something that flows from his ministry of charity and service. If a deacon is to serve at the altar, he should first serve among the people of God. His real connection with and among God's people is why the deacon is the ordinary minister of the Kyrie (Lord, have mercy), all litanies during the liturgical year as well as the general intercessions at Mass. Knowing well what is happening in the lives of people, he gathers their concerns and liturgically becomes their voice. The role of the deacon at Mass is not that of a glorified altar server or of a mini-priest. Rather, he models diaconal service for the church.

The particular duties a deacon has within the Mass, the *General Instruction on the Roman Missal* notes the following:

- Prior to Mass, the deacon vests wearing a white alb, a diaconal stole (which crosses from the left shoulder over the chest toward the hip) and a dalmatic (a calf length tunic, wide at the sleeves);
- As the deacon comes before the altar, he honors it with a profound bow and then, with the priest, kisses the altar which is a symbol of Jesus Christ. If the tabernacle is in the sanctuary, there is a genuflection before it to acknowledge the presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament;
- When present, a deacon carries the Book of the Gospels in the entrance procession and places it upon the altar;
- The deacon is the ordinary minister for proclaiming the Gospel during the Liturgy of the Word. He seeks first a blessing from the priest celebrant. Before proclaiming the Gospel, he greets those assembled saying, "The Lord be with you...;"
- The deacon may on occasion and under pastoral circumstances preach the homily;
- While the priest introduces and concludes the general intercessions at Mass, the deacon is to announce the specific needs he is well aware of because of his ministry of charity. The intercessions express concerns, not only of the local church, but also the concerns of the universal church and the needs of the wider world;
- Having received the gifts of bread and wine, the priest entrusts them to the deacon who prepares the altar. When all is ready, he signals the priest who then offers the prayers over the gifts;
- During the Eucharistic Prayer, the deacon stands near but slightly behind the priest so that he can assist with the chalice or the Missal as needed;
- From the epiclesis (prayer calling down the Spirit) until the showing of the chalice, the deacon kneels, unless health or another good reason requires him to stand;
- The deacon assists at the elevation of the Blessed Sacrament at the end of the Eucharistic Prayer, showing the chalice as the priest says or sings, "Through him, with him and in him . . .,"

- The deacon invites the assembly to share the sign of peace;
- If needed, the deacon assists the priest in breaking the bread and distributing it into containers;
- The deacon may distribute the Eucharistic Bread but, as a normal minister of the chalice, he usually distributes the Precious Blood from the chalice;
- Following Communion, the deacon may purify the sacred vessels and then clears off the altar;
- At the final blessing, the deacon invites the assembly to bow their heads to receive God's blessing. After the blessing, he dismisses the assembly with a formula such as "Go in peace to love and serve the Lord."

**Talking to Your Children About the Faith**

Parents are the primary religious educators of their children. Young people frequently ask, "If I lead a good life, respect other people, and pray in private, why do I have to go to church?" Perhaps the answer to that question is "All of that is just fine, but the idea is to do all that with all the other people who do all that."

One of the purposes of going to church is to see that you are not the only one who does good works, loves your neighbor (even when they are unlovable), and struggles daily with doing what is expected of a Catholic. Finally, going to Mass and receiving the Eucharist should provide us with the sustenance and strength we need to go out there and do it all over the coming week.

At World Youth Day in March, Pope Benedict XVI offered this advice: "In every sport and every profession, in every artistic expression, the art of being human requires self-denial, real self-denial, which helps us not to fall into the abyss of drugs and alcohol or the slavery of sex and money or laziness." He urged youth to overcome these obstacles by living a life close to God.

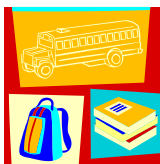
