Paschal Triduum

The Triduum is one Liturgy, a single feast. It begins with Holy Thursday, reaches its high point with the Easter Vigil and closes officially with the Evening Prayer of Easter Sunday. Let's look at the "Three Days":

Holy Thursday: This is the night we memorialize the Last Supper; it is not a re-enactment but a commemoration of Jesus' passion, death and resurrection in the context of a ritual meal. The Mass of Holy Thursday does not end...rather the consecrated bread is taken out of the church and placed at the "altar of repose" where it remains, typically with 24-hour veneration by parishioners, until communion during the Good Friday service.

Good Friday: While the focus of this liturgy is the crucifixion, we still celebrate the entire paschal mystery. It is important to remember that we only commemorate the crucifixion. It is the resurrection that we celebrate. In the Communion Rite we are partaking in the consecrated bread from the Holy Thursday liturgy because after the mass on Holy Thursday the Liturgy of the Eucharist is not celebrated again until the Easter Vigil.

Holy Saturday: Today is a solemn day of preparation for Catechumens, a "retreat day" of sorts. The rest of the parish community might consider how to use this day to prepare for Easter as well.

The Easter Vigil is the most important and beautiful liturgy of the church year. The Vigil begins after nightfall with the lighting of the Easter fire. *Continued on page 2*



For others, like parishioners Morgan Smith and Ashton Statelen, being called to serve involves school service projects, like helping the



Knights of Columbus unload Christmas trees each year. "It feels good to help," explained Morgan. "I know it's for a good cause, but it's fun, too – it makes me feel good and like a part of the church, too." Riley Nichols said that community service is so much a part of the education at Central that it becomes a part of you. "I know most of us will help whenever we're needed even after we graduate – it's just what you do." The work ethic of Central students is influenced by their teachers, such as Jane Ray, Shel Hanser and Michele Mattix, all St. Pius parishioners, who work alongside the students anytime a service project comes along.

Grant Kelly, currently a seminarian at Holy Trinity College at the University of Dallas, made the ultimate commitment to serve and live the Gospel in his decision to become a priest. For many of Grant's friends and teachers, that decision came as no surprise. "Grant has always been such a nice guy - kind, honest - someone who tries to help anytime someone needs it," said underclassman Libby Harris. One of Grant's teachers at Central agreed, saying, "When Grant announced that he was going to become a priest I saw it as a perfect extension to the young man we had already seen him become – a friend who always had time to listen and help his friends, and a kid whose insight and faith was a benefit to all of us at Central."







RCIA: Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults

The RCIA process is a faith journey for men, women and children over the age of 7, who are seeking full membership in the Catholic Church. It is a spiritual journey that happens over time. The process allows an individual the time and resources to grow and mature in faith. It is a time of conversion, a turning to meet God in a whole new way.

The process begins with the Inquiry stage. This is a time of welcome, of getting comfortable with a faith community, and of learning how God has been at work in all our lives. It is a time to ask questions and to realize that the questions are sometimes more valuable than the answers. The Inquiry stage is flexible and requires no commitments.

The Catechumenate is the next phase of the spiritual journey. The unbaptized inquirer enters the church as a Catechumen through the Rite of Acceptance. Christians, already baptized, who feel called to live out their baptismal commitments as Catholics, are welcomed as Candidates for Full Communion in the Catholic Church. Both Catechumens and Candidates pray, study, reflect, serve and worship together within the larger community, allowing the Holy Spirit to draw them deeper into the mystery of God.

Those who feel ready to incorporate this mystery into their lives as Catholics are called by the Church to celebrate the Sacraments of—Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil. Their lives, born anew in Christ, bear eloquent witness to who we are as the people of God.

Please pray for the Elect as they continue toward the Easter Sacraments. Please join us on Holy Saturday at 8:30pm for the most beautiful Liturgy of the year, the Easter Vigil.

Ginny Mermel, the BackPack Meals and Teen Pantry Program Coordinator for School District 2, was invited to speak at the February Christian Service meeting by Richard King. Richard, moved by a recent Billings Gazette article on the Program, wondered if St. Pius X could help with this project that lessens hunger among students.

Ginny's presentation began with insights on the correlation between hunger and learning. The program began in the fall of 2009 and supports children in SD 2 through meals tucked into students' backpacks on Fridays. The meals provide es-

Tootsie Roll Drive

St. Pius X Council 9976 Knights of Columbus conducted their 24th annual Tootsie Roll Giveaway Drive on Palm Sunday weekend. This Knights of Columbus (KC) community activity program has been a national KC fundraiser for over 40 years and for the past 36 years in Montana, resulting in tens of thousands of dollars going to local organizations that serve those with special needs in communities across America. Over the past 23 years, St. Pius X Council 9976 has collected and donated almost \$70,000.00 to assist developmentally disabled groups in Billings and Montana. The KCs solicit financial aid from local businesses, which covers the cost. Twenty percent of the donated net proceeds is

The cost of each meal is approximately \$4, which comes from the Montana Food Bank Network. The meals contain single-serving food items such as fruit cups, chili, cereal, etc. The meals are boxed at the warehouse in Billings, delivered to the schools on Friday and distributed to students at Title 1 schools who have been identified by counselors as individuals in need. school has 50% or more students living at or below the poverty level, which is a family of four living on \$22,000 or less per year. About 100 meals are taken to Orchard Elementary alone. A volunteer

contributed to the State KC Council to provide aid to smaller communities in Montana that may not have a KC Council. The remaining 80% is distributed on a local level. Council 9976 will distribute checks to local special organizations: Yellowstone Association of Retarded Citizens, Special 'K' Ranch, local Special Olympics and St. Francis discreetly tucks the meals in student backpacks while the child is at lunch recess. This year, 225 meals were requested at the beginning of the year. To date, 292 meals are given weekly.

In addition to the Backpack Meal Program, a Teen Pantry became necessary at Middle and High schools to serve emancipated teens or teens without family support. St. Pius X would like to try stocking a Teen Pantry at Billings West or Senior High School. On Holy Thursday, we will ask parishioners to bring donated items to the church for this purpose. There are approximately 200 students who utilize these Teen Pantries. Please watch the bulletin for a list of specific items needed. Food items to stock a Teen Pantry will need to be single serve. Small size toiletries and hygiene products are also needed.

Council 9976 is sincerely grateful for the stores that allow them visibility each year as well to all who contribute to the success of the drive. Hundreds of St. Pius X KCs, Central High Students, Columbian Squires and family members have

given candy away at local businesses and churches to make the annual drive a success.

Ten (10) Easy Ways to Carry Easter Forward

On the First Friday of Lent we read from Isaiah 58:6-9

Is this not, rather, the fast that I choose: releasing those bound unjustly, untying the thongs of the yoke; Setting free the oppressed, breaking off every yoke? Is it not sharing your bread with the hungry, bringing the afflicted and the homeless into your house; Clothing the naked when you see them, and not turning your back on your own flesh? Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your wound shall quickly be healed; Your vindication shall go before you, and the glory of the LORD shall be your rear guard. Then you shall call, and the LORD will answer, you shall cry for help, and he will say: "Here I am!"

How can you continue the commitment to the lessons learned while fasting as found in Isaiah after Easter? Following are ten easy ways you can answer "Here I am!" in our parish community:

- 1. Clean out your closets and take gently used clothing to either St. Vincent de Paul 252-1855, or Dress for Success 256-7304.
- 2. Interfaith Hospitality Network our parish hosts homeless families as our guests 4 times a year. There are a number of ways to help that can take as little as an hour or as long as an overnight. Call Shelly Green-field at the parish offices if you'd like to help, 656-2522.
- 3. Daily Readings our weekly bulletin lists the readings and has a weekly reflection. You may also want to go to our parish website www.stpiusxblgs.org and click on the Daily Reflections found on our homepage.
- 4. St. Vincent de Paul has ongoing volunteer opportunities and ways to donate, 252-1855.
- 5. Teen Pantry Program (watch for details in parish bulletin) our Christian Service Commission will be sharing ways our parish can help this all important program to help hungry teens in our community.
- 6. Christian Service Commission if you feel called to learn more about Catholic Social Teaching and serve our parish in this way, please contact Shelly Greenfield in the parish office at 656-2522.
- 7. Consider becoming a sponsor for someone interested in becoming Catholic, call Karyn Haider at the parish office, 656-2522, for more information.
- 8. Cum Christo. Cum Christo emerged from the Catholic Cursillo and brings adults together for a 3-day "workshop in Christian living. " Participants are urged to grow as disciples of Jesus by gathering weekly in small "Group Reunions" to share their relationship with Jesus, their Christian study and Christian action.
