Beginning Again: Talking with God

We have good intentions and resolves and one thing so many of us want is a deeper relationship with God. It is a longing that comes from our hearts but we don't always know what to do with it. Here are a few hints and resources to get us started – or re-started – talking to God. It sounds simple, so why does it get complicated?

The good news is that God is the one who really wants to talk with us. God wants us to feel that he loves us with a bottomless love and is just waiting to listen to anything we want to say. Further proof of this good news: It was God who sparked our hearts to make us want to respond to him in a newer way. What is standing in our way?

I just don't know where to begin.

We can reflect on our prayer and what we mean by prayer. Sometimes the most difficult journey in prayer is the short distance from our heads to our hearts. We might enjoy reading theology and spirituality books and websites, but it can draw us into *concepts* and *ideas* about God rather than feeling in our hearts how much we are loved by God. The shift in focus happens when we move from "saying prayers" to praying in the sense of entering into a close, personal relationship, which centers on a sense of closeness, accompaniment and intimacy. Prayer is really just conversation with someone who loves us more than we can imagine. What do we want to thank God for? What do we worry about? What are we facing today? What do we want to ask of God? Speak, then listen.

I don't have a minute free all day – when can I possibly pray?

Spending 30 minutes in silent meditation is wonderful, but most of us can't do that in our lives. But we all can find small "in-between" moments in our lives when we can find a greater intimacy with God. It means looking for the tiniest spaces in our day when we can simply lift our hearts to God.

St. Ignatius encouraged his followers to be "Contemplatives in Action," "seeking and finding intimacy with God, in all things," and we can do that by continually tucking small prayer spaces into our days. Developing this pattern in our days can help us feel accompanied by God all day long.

Here are a few suggestions. Which ones might work for you today?

- Brushing teeth is something we do every day for a few minutes. If we transform that time into a simple dialog with God, it can begin and end our day in prayer.
- A drive in the car can become a brief retreat if we turn off the radio and use that time to have a conversation with God.
- A regular shower or bath time can be the perfect, undistracted spot to connect with the One who loves us.
- We can pray walking to a meeting, crossing a street or heading into a store.
- As we reach to answer a phone, a 2 second prayer for the person calling can change my interaction with the caller.
- If we find our mind wanders, gently transform it into a prayer by saying to God, "I am distracted by the meeting I have today. Let me tell you what I am worried about." Or, "I can tell I am preoccupied by my relationship problems with my brother. Please give me the grace to forgive him." We can take our distractions to God and ask for help. Ask, "Where is my focus, on me or on God?"

Important Children's Ministry Information

Just a reminder that completion of the Sacraments of Initiation for children is a two-year process. Classes are held weekly during the school year and provide a child-friendly opportunity to grow in faith and community. We hope these classes will be a great resource to you as you share Christ's love with your child.

The first year usually coincides with first grade. Please note: The first year of Sacramental Preparation may be completed in **one** of two ways:

- Attendance in the Billings Catholic Schools
- Attendance in a Parish Children's Ministry class

The second year of classes will include sacramental preparation and reception of the Sacrament of Reconciliation, and the completion of the Sacraments of Initiation: Confirmation and First Eucharist. This is only offered through the parish and **not** in the Catholic schools.

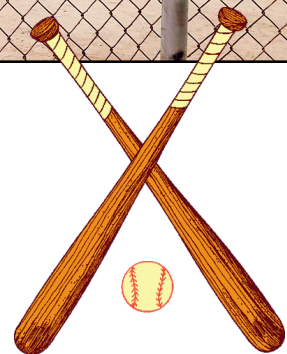

How about showing kindness to the mean voices within you that urge you to do wrong? They are misguided, for sure, but maybe they will settle down if you just love them as you would a naughty child. Love them into goodness.

Can you imagine Jesus saying from the cross, "Father, damn them to Hell forever because of what they are doing to me"? That would be a major case of tearing out the wheat as well as the weeds. He leaves the latter and says, "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do." Forgive the weeds.

Scripture Reflection:

Sixteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time

Wisdom 12:13, 16-19
Psalm 86:5-6, 9-10, 15-16
Romans 8:26-27
Matthew 13:24-43

In this week's Gospel story, the servants ask whether they should pull out weeds that have been woven in with the wheat. "No," the Master says. "If you pull up the weeds you might uproot the wheat along with them. Let them grow together until harvest". This parable says a lot.

God steadily forgives our weeds and lets us grow without uprooting us. It is not that he wants to encourage wildflowers, and it would be better if they were not there, but he loves everything about us and wants us preserved even in the midst of weeds. This is a radical idea. You and I think we have to be sinless in order to be loved. If not we will be punished instead of forgiven. Entire ancient cultures based themselves on this principle of non-love and non-forgiveness for those who sin. If someone harms me or my family, then I have the right and duty to annihilate them since they are bad persons, no good, and punishment is never too severe.

The same goes for the heroes in adventure movies. They fight, he-man to he-man, somersaulting across skyscraper tops, delivering bare-knuckle blows to the face, spinning out kicks to the head, wielding secret weapons and tricks. Finally the bad guy plummets over an awful edge of the building, and entertains us with magnificent slow-motion shots of his terror as he heads for the inevitable splotch. Everyone is relieved and happy. Except, of course, the bad guy. And maybe the good guy too, since there remains a thing called conscience, and brutality of such scope well might interrupt his sleep that night.

Just for an exercise, pretend that you are the villain in such a scene. Is there a reason you are committing crimes that merit such punishment? Is it possible that one part of you is going haywire but that there is also much good in you, much that could be brought back to life? Maybe deep down you have a voice whispering, "I wish I could stop this ugliness and be a good person"?

If this is so, then you have stumbled upon the point of Sunday's Gospel. The crimes you commit don't really agree with your real, God-given self. They are bad things, just like the weeds growing up in the garden. But they are only a portion of who you are. Your urge to impress others falsely, to get what you want no matter what, to be lazy, petulant, even to steal, or ... (please fill in your kind of sin), these are never the full description of who you are.

God does not rip out the weeds in other people or in ourselves. Mixed with all the crab grass, there is
