Praying Advent with Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation, The Joy of the Gospel

dvent can be a great time to reflect upon the first part of the message of Pope Francis' exhortation, The Joy of the Gospel. The heart of what Pope Francis says is contained in the opening sentence of the exhortation:

The joy of the gospel fills the hearts and lives of all who encounter Jesus. [1]

Pope Francis is sharing with us the Good News itself and encouraging us to be filled with the joy which can come from believing the Gospel. It is this joy, which will change the way we live and the way we are perceived by others, which will animate our sharing of the Gospel with others.


Pope Francis begins by warning us about how our culture impacts us and robs us of our joy and our compassion:

The great danger in today's world, pervaded as it is by consumerism, is the desolation and anguish born of a

ere it is Advent 2014, the beginning of a New Liturgical year. We will hear from the Gospel of Mark the first two Sundays of Advent and throughout the year as we move to the Year B cycle of Sunday readings. I always feel sorry for the season of Advent. It is caught between the tension of what it "wants" to be and what it "needs" to be. With Christmas stuff being out in the stores before Halloween it seems like a losing battle. But complaining against the commercialism that overshadows the religious observance of Advent is futile at best. I think what we need to do is recognize the fullness of this complex season and celebrate that fullness amidst all that is going on around us. Let us all remember the center of all this is Christ, the Word that came and dwelt among us. It is a time to celebrate God's love for us. Advent is a time of joyful anticipation. It is not a mini-Lent even as it has a penitential element about it. Let us not then get dragged down about all the commercial stuff around us; but, rather let us see all the decoration and lights as a pre-celebration of the real celebration of how the Light of Christ came to shine on us and show us The Way. Let us greet one another with the traditional Advent phrase "MARANATHA": Come Lord Jesus Come!

Praying Advent with Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation, The Joy of the Gospel, continued:

complacent yet covetous heart, the feverish pursuit of frivolous pleasures, and a blunted conscience. Whenever our interior life becomes caught up in its own interests and concerns, there is no longer room for others, no place for the poor. God's voice is no longer heard, the quiet joy of his love is no longer felt, and the desire to do good fades. This is a very real danger for believers too. Many fall prey to it, and end up resentful, angry and listless. That is no way to live a dignified and fulfilled life; it is not God's will for us, nor is it the life in the Spirit which has its source in the heart of the risen Christ. [2]

Then, Pope Francis offers the remedy for this danger - our personal relationship with Jesus:

I invite all Christians, everywhere, at this very moment, to a renewed personal encounter with Jesus Christ, or at least an openness to letting him encounter them; I ask all of you to do this unfailingly each day. No one should think that this invitation is not meant for him or her, since "no one is

excluded from the joy brought by the Lord".[Paul VI, Apostolic Exhortation Gaudete in Domino (9 May 1975)] [3]



ast year when I made my report to the parish, I mentioned how blessed our parish was to have such caring and supportive parishioners. Once again our parish has been very giving and we ended the June 30, 2014 fiscal year with a \$43,912 surplus. The Finance Council has taken this surplus and added it to the parish Capital Improvement Fund.

When you have come to Mass the last several weeks you have no doubt noticed the ongoing roofing and window projects. The roof project is an expense that has involved several years of preparation and planning by the Finance Council. Many years ago, we began setting aside annual surpluses

ANNUAL BUDGET INFORMATION

A. Offerings for weddings, baptisms, funerals and Mass Intentions.

B. Fees for baptism / marriage preparation, fellowship hall rental and interest income.

C. We currently have 21 full and part-time employees on our parish staff.

D. Our parish assessment for the Billings Catholic Schools.

E. Utilities, maintenance, supplies, taxes and insurance for our church, the parish center and the youth center.

F. Support for Peru Mission, assistance to needy families, local appeals and other charitable causes.

G. When the Diocesan Care & Share assessment is not met by donations from parishioners, the shortfall must come out of the parish operations budget. Thanks to your support of Care and Share we were able to meet our assessment this year without affecting the operating budget.

H. The diocese has a 7% tax on parish income for diocesan operations.

I. The diocese has implemented a parish assessment which funds the retirement plan for all priests of the diocese.

J. RCIA, baptism / marriage preparation and parish life activities.

K. Thanks to your generosity, we ended the fiscal year with \$43,912 in surplus which we were able to deposit into our Capital Improvement Fund. Our Capital Improvement Fund ended the fiscal year with a balance of \$336,145 which enabled us to plan payment for much needed replacement of the church roof and repairs to the sanctuary windows without having to borrow funds. The work on these two big projects will be completed by the end of the year and be fully paid for!

EDUCATION COMMISSION TRANSITION UPDATE

Members of the Task Force included staff, parishioners and Billings Catholic Campus Ministries. Father Wayne continued the Task Force after Father Steve passed away. The need for the Task Force was to focus on immediate issues like parent involvement in sacramental prep and the overwhelming need for adult faith formation. The Task Force's mission concluded in the spring of 2014 after interviewing the parish on the needs of the community through a guided process. Those interviews acted as a compass for the Task Force's transition into the current Education Commission.

Our current commission has been working hard to align the goals of formation with the greater parish vision. Some of our immediate tasks include updating the parish library with new and contemporary materials, assisting parish groups with identifying formation materials and developing a commission mission statement. MISSION STATEMENT EDUCATION COMMISSION

The Education Commission is responsible for the religious education and formation of all parishioners. It is the liaison between the Parish Pastoral Council and those persons or bodies within the parish structure responsible for the various aspects of total parish religious education. Adult faith formation should be the primary focus. "An adult community whose faith is well formed and lively will more effectively pass that faith on to the next generation. In addition, adult faith formation should serve as the point of reference for catechesis for other age groups. It ought to be, 'the organizing principle', which gives coherence to the various catechetical programs offered by a particular church." (Quote from Our Hearts Were Burning Within Us: A Pastoral Plan for Adult Faith Formation in the United States USCCB)

THE DARKER SIDE OF "TIS THE SEASON"

s a people we are hopefully becoming more aware of the painful reality that the holiday season from Thanksgiving through New Years can be a time of deep depression for friends and loved ones. We hope that the stories of our parish community's life can be ones of joy and thanksgiving. Yet often our stories include pain. So what can we do to help one another? The following information is provided by our Parish Nurses:

Your sister wants you to come over so she can give you her cherished Beatles record collection. A fellow worker declines a second invitation to watch the Broncos game with you. Should you be concerned? Maybe. Giving away prized possessions and choosing not to interact with others, MAY be a sign that a person is considering suicide. If you are concerned, it is appropriate to ask if the person is considering suicide or hurting her or himself; asking the suicide question does not increase the risk of suicide. Should the person respond, 'yes' please stay with the person. If the threat is imminent call 911; otherwise call the Mental Health Center at 252-5658 or the National Lifeline at 800-273-8255.

There are other more subtle signs that a person may need help. Montana ranks high in the incidence of depression, and depression is one of the leading causes of suicide. Some signs of depression include: loss of energy, hopelessness, persistent sadness (without another explanation), persistent fatigue, persistent guilt, irritability, inability to concentrate, decreased interest in day to day activities, significant change of body weight, inability to get some sleep or excessive sleeping. Should you see these in others or in yourself please suggest they talk to their health care provider or seek counseling from a mental health professional. Help is available. You can call Billings Clinic Behavioral Health at 252-8550; St. Vincent Healthcare Behavioral Health at 237-3585 or the Mental Health Center at 252-5658.

Sometimes no matter what we do a friend or family member follows through and commits suicide. It is important that we forgive ourselves. It is equally important that we find someone with whom we can talk about our feelings. That person can be a friend or relative or a mental health professional.

Some history of suicide in our state:

Did you know that Montana has ranked among the top five states for completed suicide for decades? Montanans commit suicide at nearly twice the national rate. Military veterans, American Indians, senior citizens and teenagers are more likely to commit suicide than others in the general populations.

Have you ever wondered why so many Montanans attempt and complete suicide? There are four major reasons: social isolation, incidence of depression, method used and high alcohol use. For the full details on these four aspects and more statistical data, please check the parish website:
